



When you are reading and a character says or does something that is opposite (contradicts) what he/she has been doing all along, or a character responds in a way you would not expect, stop and ask yourself...

"WHY IS THE CHARACTER DOING THAT?"

The answer to this question can help you make a prediction or an inference about the PLOT or the CONFLICT of the story.





- A character has a change in attitude or behavior.
- A character is different from the beginning of the story than at the end.

These are just some clues you may find in your reading to help you recognize Contrasts & Contradictions.




When you are reading and you notice a word, phrase, object, or situation happening over and over, stop and ask yourself...

"WHY DOES THIS KEEP HAPPENING AGAIN & AGAIN?"

The answer to this question can tell you about a THEME or CONFLICT or it might foreshadow what will happen later in the story.





- A situation occurs repeatedly.
- A character repeats the same word, phrase, or action.


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


When you are reading and a character asks himself/
herself or another character a very difficult question, stop and ask yourself...

WHAT DOES THIS MAKE ME WONDER ABOUT?"

The questions you generate can tell you about a CONFLICT or it might foreshadow what will happen later in the story...






- This is not a simple question but a deep question about life or a struggle.
- The question does not have to come from the main character only.
- These are just some clues you may find in your reading to help you recognize Tough Questions. ●



When you are reading and suddenly a character realizes, understands, or finally figures something out, stop and ask yourself...

"HOW MIGHT THIS CHANGE THINGS?"

If the character figured out a problem, you probably just figured out the CONFLICT. If the character understood a life lesson, you probably just learned a THEME.



"Suddenly"

"Then I knew"

"It came to me"

"I realized"

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These are just some clues you may find in your reading to help you recognize Aha Moments.



When you are reading and the author interrupts the action to share a memory or a flashback, stop and ask yourself...

"WHY MIGHT THIS MEMORY BE IMPORTANT?"

The answers to this question can tell you about a THEME or a CONFLICT or it might foreshadow what will happen later in the story.

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




When you are reading and a character (who may be older and wiser) shares serious advice with another character, stop and ask yourself...

"WHAT IS THE LIFE LESSON & HOW MIGHT IT AFFECT THE CHARACTER?"

Whatever the lesson is, you've probably just discovered a THEME of the story...





- Look for a character sharing advice
- Keep in mind that sometimes the wiser character isn't always the older one!
